



Remembrance Hall

The atomic bomb that exploded over Nagasaki at 11:02 a.m. on August 9, 1945 instantaneously reduced the city to ruins and took many precious lives. Even the people who managed to survive were left with indelible mental and physical scars and with disorders due to radiation. We recognize the gravity of these sacrifices and hardships and offer heartfelt tribute to the memory of the deceased. We vow to convey the reality of the atomic bomb damages to people both in Japan and abroad, to inform future generations, to learn from history and to build a peaceful world free from nuclear weapons.



- On the upper level of the facility is a sculpted basin which holds the water that the atomic bomb victims so desperately desired.

 At night, about 70,000 optical fibers light up in mourning.
- * This figure is the estimated number of atomic bomb victims up until the end of December 1945.
