Nagasaki Atomic Bomb Museum


Nagasaki Atomic Bomb Museum opened in April 1996 as one of Nagasaki City's projects to mark

the 50th anniversary of the atomic bombing. In addition to materials on the atomic bombing and photographs showing the devastation, the Museum presents narrative displays of the events leading up to the dropping of the atomic bomb, the history of nuclear weapons development and the path to peace.



The atomic bomb that exploded over Nagasaki at 11:02 a.m. on August 9, 1945 instantaneously reduced the city to ruins and took many precious lives. Even the people who managed to survive were left with indelible mental and physical scars and with disorders due to radiation. We recognize the gravity of these sacrifices and hardships and offer heartfelt tribute to the memory of the deceased. We vow to convey the reality of the atomic bomb damages to people both in Japan and abroad, to inform future generations, to learn from history and to build a peaceful world free from nuclear weapons.


